#### Packington News March 2024

As I write, it is raining once again. But there have been one or two days which strongly hint of Spring and all the encouragement that gives us that new life is around the corner. Hopefully by the time you read this the sun will be shining and nature will be fully revealing the new growth of 2024.

This year Easter is quite early, on 31st March. I am always reminded at this time of year of the words St Paul wrote to the new Christian community in the Greek city of Corinth when explaining the realities of death and beyond:

What you sow does not come to life unless it dies ..... you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

(1 Corinthians 15.36-38)

A GP friend of mine once challenged this agricultural way of looking at human death by observing that the seed of grain, whilst appearing to be dead in its dormancy, in fact has embryonic life within it. But perhaps that is part of the point that St Paul was making: whilst our bodies may eventually die, there is more to human life than our mortal body. We have a spirit or a soul which lives on. And when you compare the tiny seed of grain with the glorious body it produces from the earth, what does that portend for us?

The Christian faith is all about love. We believe that it is a great cosmic power of self-emptying love, what we call God, which brought forth the universe and sustains it today. We believe that the death of Jesus was an act of ultimate, pure, self-giving love. We believe that his resurrection, in whatever form that was, is evidence of the power of pure love to overcome all things, even death itself. We believe that the Spirit of that love, what we refer to as the Holy Spirit, is alive in the world today, to be taken into the hearts and lives of anyone who opens themselves to that possibility.

Do join us on Easter Day at St James Chapel on the Estate for our joyful celebration of new life on 31st March at 10:30, a celebration of the power of love to bring forth new life even from the darkest winters of our own lives.



#### REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE - MARCH 2024 UPDATE By Sam White

I write this update as we get ever nearer to the spring equinox and with that, I am sure that I am not alone in hoping for the rain to stop and for the ground to start drying up!

During the winter there was relatively little 'physical activity' across the farms. At Outwoods Farm the sheep continued to do their job of keeping on top of the clover, and at Warren Farm the herbal ley was rested ahead of a planned programme of taking a cut of silage and thereafter grazing as we head into warmer months.

On the basis that ground conditions improve, we still intend to undertake field trials across one of the fields at Outwoods Farm to experiment and explore differing crops and control methods for weeds and pests.

Rather unfortunately the cover crop that we drilled last autumn at Patrick Farm did not take as well as we would have liked, and due to this we have recently taken the decision to try and establish something different that will remain as 'green cover' across the fields until we then look to establish a winter wheat crop later this year.

'Behind the scenes' there has been plenty going on, this has included liaising with consultants regarding an application being submitted, and subsequently approved, under the Government's new Sustainable Farming Incentive. 'Options' that we have entered will assist in providing increased benefit to the farmed environment and will also provide an additional source of income. We also sent soil samples from 10 fields across the farms off to the lab for a detailed analysis that would then allow us to compare against the soil tests that were undertaken in December 2020 (the cusp of when the farms transitioned to farming a low/no input system and adopting practices and techniques falling under the regenerative agriculture umbrella).





A plan was also formulated for a rotational hedge cutting plan that would be in accordance with the new Scheme that we have entered, and to ensure that there is an abundance of berries to provide a key food source for farmland birds and provide safe and secure habitat and wildlife corridors.

I have mentioned in previous updates that a key part of the regenerative farming movement is the willingness to learn and that is what we are continuing to do. We recently met with some of the Wild Farmed team to learn about how in the future we can sell grain into the expanding regenerative produce market. We also have a planned meeting with a local grower who is now commercially farming heritage grains. It will be interesting to hear more about this and how this could be integrated into our system of farming, particularly as we are operating a low/no input system and so in theory it makes sense to grow crop varieties that are less reliant on synthetic sprays and fertilisers.

In addition, following our visit to the Althorp Estate last summer we invited their team to look at how we are farming. Soil transects over a 100 metre stretch of the field that we are looking to undertake trials in included recording soil pressure, temperature, water percolation and counting worms! It was quite incredible to see how even across a short stretch of a field results can be so different. It was also interesting to talk around the subject of 'earning the right to use the plough' as sometimes this may be the most appropriate remedial action to 'reset' soils.

I hope that in the next update I will be able to provide an update as to how the field trials are going. Onwards and upwards!


#### **BOOKS**




