As I write, I am on my way home from the Swiss Alps after a seven-week-long work trip in my, soon to end when I retire in November, part-time role with the Intercontinental Church Society (www.ics-uk.org). For the past thirteen years, my responsibilities have included facilitating the chaplaincies to English-speaking people based at the Church of England churches in Wengen and Zermatt. They are great places to be based, I've enjoyed meeting and serving people from around the world, and I've had plenty of chances to enjoy the beauty and majesty of God's creation on my hikes in the hills, but I'm looking forward to being home and to beginning a new chapter in my life and in the life of the church on the Packington Estate.

Since I retired earlier this year from my other part-time role as Vicar in Leek Wootton, I have already had the pleasure of leading worship at St James' Church at Easter and the beginning of May, but from the start of July, my role expands to be offering chaplaincy services to the whole Estate community, and it is about that role that I particularly want to write for this edition. Over these next few months, I hope that we can explore together what this role might bring to the life of the Estate, integrating the church more fully into the overall vision including ecology and sustainability, and offering residents, workers and visitors pastoral and spiritual care, and a listening ear which is independent of the main management team.

As well as leading the monthly services at the church, which I am hoping to make more accessible to all ages and levels of Christian understanding and faith, I plan to be around the Estate for at least one full working day a week (to be confirmed, but probably Wednesdays in general), hopefully visiting many of the homes and businesses and getting to know people. I plan to have a dedicated phone number for use as Chaplain, although this isn't yet arranged, so that you can make contact and arrange to meet up or chat. You can also contact me by email at packingtonchaplain@gmail.com I plan to be around at many of the social events on the Estate – and to occasionally play a round on the Stonebridge Golf Course!

Psalm 24 begins with the words, 'The Earth is the Lord's, and everything in it'. As I have been enjoying the majestic mountains and amazing views, and also the beautiful plants and wildlife, of the Alps, it is easy to focus on the creation, but to forget to look beyond it to be in relationship with the Creator / OUR Creator. The same danger is there in our daily work and home life where, often, the mundane activities and the everyday or sudden problems and stresses can fill or numb our minds and our soul. But, just as the sun is always there – even on a cloudy day or at dead of night when we cannot see it, so I believe that God is always there for each and every one of us, whatever may be the barriers or the darkness in our lives that stop us perceiving him and his love. If, in my role, I can offer a glimpse of Son-shine through listening or through prayer – either with you or for you – or simply through offering a friendly smile, then please allow me to serve you over these coming months.

1.0 **MEETING – 13TH MAY 2024**


NEW BOOK












What's going on at The Stables?



ROGER STONE 1933-2025



Some of you will recall that Roger Stone was head agent for Packington between 1963 and 1990. Thereafter, he remained a Trustee and PEEL Board member. He provided sound and wise advice over many years and was instrumental in helping the Estate recover from penalising death duties arising from family losses in 1940 and 1958. This included important negotiations on land-take for the M6 (across the north side of the Estate) in the 1960s, important sand and gravel negotiations (that led to the creation of Broadwater and Somers Fisheries), the establishment of the Packington Landfill site and the commencement of the Forest of Arden Golf & Country Club. Roger will be sadly missed by all at Packington. An obituary covering his wider life is set out below.

Roger was born on the 25th March 1933 in Alvechurch and spent his childhood at Stable Door House, on School Lane, where he planted a tree seed which now stands in excess of 8oft. He was schooled at West House, Eastborne College and was called up for National Service in the late 1950s, towards the end of obligatory military service and spent time in Cyprus, in the Royal Signals, during the Eoka Guerilla Uprising.

On return, he was employed by Cheshire Gibson & Co where he trained to be a Chartered Surveyor via a correspondence course at the College of Estate Management. In early 1960 he moved to James & Lister Lea (Bruton Knowles), and became a Partner in 1963, where he remained until he retired from the practice in the late 1990s. He consulted there for a few years before trading until his late 80s as "RV Stone Chartered Surveyor".

Roger was a keen supporter of the RICS, CAAV and the Panel of Arbitrators and was, himself, a qualified Arbitrator, specialising in agricultural rent reviews and matters arising from the Agricultural Holdings Act. He was President of the Rural Practice Division of the RICS between 1988 and 1989 and threw himself into the role.

He also served with distinction on various CLA Committees and was integral in the formation and running of the RECAP lectures held in Staffordshire.

Roger was a colourful character in every way and was a believer in the sharing of knowledge to help all surveyors improve their ability to serve their clients. He had no fear of standing up to speak, or challenge those with whom he was either in negotiation or dispute and ran both planning and compulsory purchase appeals over many years.

At James & Lister Lea, he built up the agricultural management and professional services side, serving as head agent and Clerk to a number of local estates and charities. His natural capabilities, competence and inquisitiveness, drove him forward in the pursuit of the best deal for his clients.

FARMING AND ENVIRONMENT UPDATE - JULY 2025 UPDATE By Sam White

I find myself writing this update at the beginning of August and on a day on which it seems that the weather does not know what it is doing, and it is one of those days where you are unsure if a shirt will do or if a jumper and coat is needed!

In the past few months there has been a great deal of activity across the Estate, and I will start with an update on our Estate farms...

We are still yet to harvest our oats and wheat however we do not envisage the yields being record breaking! I will be able to provide an update in the next newsletter as to how we fared, and it will be most interesting to see how the oats perform following our decision to take a reset and re-evaluate our approach with the integration of regenerative farming techniques and methods.

Through trials and continued learning we are still finessing our cropping rotation and following this harvest we will then immediately get set on working the land to ensure that there is then a green cover during the winter months ahead of spring drilling in 2026. Our current plan is to adopt a 6-year rotation that would provide opportunities for combinable cropping, grazing of livestock, and assisting in the building of soil fertility and structure. Our current intention is:

- Years 1 to 3, spring drilled cereal crops such as oats, barley, wheat (followed by an autumn/ winter cover crop).
- Years 4 to 6, establishment of a herbal ley.

Farming is at the mercy of the weather and frustratingly it is one of the pressures that we have no control over. Earlier this year seemed to transition straight from winter to summer, and it was reported that it was the driest March in over 60 years!

The dry spring has resulted in us having to change tack regarding some aspects of the environmental provision into our farming system as part of our approved Sustainable Farming Incentive (SFI) Agreement, which is the current DEFRA support for the agricultural sector. We had intended on a spring establishment of over 50 acres of flower rich margins and plots however, the weather thwarted our plans and as a result it was decided to leave the seed in the shed and instead look to undertake the works in the autumn (if the weather is favourable!). On the flipside our cereal headland mixes were drilled and have established well and were able to make the most of the limited days of rain and so will now provide a source of food during the winter months for farmland birds.

I have recently had an opportunity to read 'Sixty Harvests Left' by Philip Lymbery; it was a sombre and hard hitting read and highlighted the importance in having an open mindset and exploring alternative methods for food production and wider land management. I am fortunate to be involved with the Country Land and Business Association (CLA) and it has been interesting to hear that the train of thought by Government regarding future agricultural support is changing and now partially focusing on food security. We will see over the next few months what the future holds regarding support - ultimately Government policy dictates the nature of the landscape that we all enjoy.

Moving on to our nature restoration project...

A great amount of work has taken place over the past few months regarding 'Wild Packington'. On the ground works have taken place with the creation of new wetland scrapes and the shallow excavation of a historic paleo channel. Both will provide habitat for breeding waders and alongside this we have worked with stakeholders including the Tame Valley Wetlands Trust and also local angling societies regarding in river works to the River Blythe that will assist in improving water flow and quality.

Our English Longhorn cattle herd now totals 32 and includes nine calves (six girls and three boys) and we still have two cows that are due to calve in the next few weeks. Over the summer months they have been assisting in managing the project area through extensive grazing. They certainly do have their own characters, and the calves can be very cheeky in testing for weak points with the electric fencing!

We have the worrying time of TB testing to go through in the next couple of months and during that period we will also be fitting electronic collars that will monitor and track where the cattle are via an App based system (created and developed by a company in Norway!). I will be able to update you all on how we get on with that in my next update.

Behind the scenes we are continuing to work at the implementation plan for the project which includes the preparation of a Stewardship agreement that requires the inclusion of plans and strategies linked with:

- River restoration
- Species rich grassland
- Wood pasture
- Parkland restoration

Aspects of this work have stemmed following the preparation of the masterplan. This has also included looking at what has established on the ground since conventional farming ceased and reviewing soil analysis results to enable seed mixes to be worked up that will be suitable.

To facilitate the project stakeholder engagement has and continues to be a key aspect and we are working with private consultants and also organisations that include:

- Warwickshire Wildlife Trust
- Tame Valley Wetlands Trust
- Environment Agency
- University of Birmingham
- Coventry University

FARMING AND ENVIRONMENT UPDATE - JULY 2025 UPDATE By Sam White

In and amongst the farmed landscape and the land covering the nature restoration project, and the wider Estate, there are more than 600 acres of woodland that are a mix of amenity hardwood (broadleaf species such as Oak, Ash, etc) and commercial softwood plantations (conifers that include Douglas Fir, Scots Pine, etc). Through working with our forestry consultants, both the Estate Team and external contractors are working in accordance with the 20-year Forestry Management Plan (approved by the Forestry Commission). There are ongoing maintenance aspects and more substantial works and recently this has seen us start a thinning operation in a couple of woodland blocks which is being undertaken to enable natural regeneration. It is quite amazing at the size of some of the machinery that is involved in facilitating these works.

I look forward to updating you all later this year which should hopefully include an introduction to a new addition who we hope will be making an arrival at Packington in the next few weeks... Xploit the Bull!

ACTION

1.0 **MEETING – 13TH MAY 2024**

- 1.1 The Minutes of the meeting held on the 13th May 2024 were approved and signed by Lord James Guernsey, as a true record. They had previously been circulated within the summer edition of the Packington Parish Magazine.
- 1.2 Matters arising from the 13th May 2024 meeting were as follows.

1.2.1 Packington Park Cameras

The number plate recognition at the East Gate was now in operation and that if members of the Parish wished to have their number plate included, they should provide details to the Packington Estate Office.

1.2.2 Dog Fouling Signage

Sam White

It was confirmed that dog fouling signs had been received and that these were at the Packington Estate and would be displayed in appropriate areas in the coming months.

2.0 **PARISH PRECEPT**

Ben Gray

2.1 Ben Gray confirmed that as the Parish / Church has no income, or expenditure (as such), it does not require a Precept from the Local Council, but it will make a Declaration of No Accounts for the period 2024/2025.

3.0 NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH / SECURITY / CRIME

3.1 Fly-Tipping

3.1.1 Fly-tipping continued to be a menace across the area and the Parish, but visitors and residents should continue to report and where appropriate and safe to do so, approach perpetrators.

- 3.1.2 The Packington Estate WhatsApp group had been an effective means of ensuring fly-tipping activity was reported and that "Fixmystreet" had proved to be a successful web-site and responses from the Council had been positive.
- 3.1.3 Lord Guernsey also reminded the meeting of the "clearwaste" web-site, and encouraged those at the meeting to use this site to report fly-tipping. By way of reminder, the web-sites are:

3.2 Coursing - Deer and Hare

3.2.1 Ben Gray confirmed that there had been one incident, from Little Packington Lane, with suspected coursers and this had been dealt with appropriately. The Estate is engaging with Constable Dickin who is based in Atherstone, regarding rural crime.

3.3 Trespass

- 3.3.1 Ben Gray reported that there had been a number of incidents, some of which were genuinely people venturing off the beaten track and not realising the Estate was generally private, but also an incident where some gypsy ponies had escaped from a field and the situation was resolved quickly.
- 3.3.2 Again, the Packington WhatsApp Group was a useful means of keeping members of the Parish informed as to any activity.

4.0 PACKINGTON ESTATE - RE-NATURING PROJECT

Sam White 4.1

- 4.1 Sam White reported that the re-naturing project was going well, that the base line studies had now been completed and that a Master Plan was in the process of being finalised. Once the Master Plan was complete, updates to the Parish will be provided.
- 4.2 Sam White confirmed that to kick-start the re-naturing programme, a number of English Longhorn Cattle had been purchased, and these were currently on the land at Brook Farm

6.0 **ANY OTHER BUSINESS**

6.1 The Stables Conversion

6.1.1 Ben Gray reported that the conversion of The Stables building was progressing well, despite being slightly behind programme and that it was anticipated that the space should be completed by Christmas 2025. As a result, it was likely that this would be the last Parish Meeting to be held in the Undercroft of the Hall, as there was to be some new social space for the Estate and the Parish, to be included within the first phase of the project.

6.2 **Area G**

- 6.2.1 David Mander asked what the plans were for Area G? BG informed the meeting that the Estate were effectively engaged with the Master Planning of a new country park, and that it was important that the requirements were planned well in advance to ensure that the inert soil tipping was placed in the correct locations as, once the soil was in situ, it would be difficult to move it.
- 6.2.2 BG also advised that whilst the pre-application and a planning consent were likely to happen during 2025, it would be a further 5-6 years before the inert tipping ceased and, at that point, there would be a permanent change of use.

6.3 Estate Wide Vision

- 6.3.1 Lord James Guernsey confirmed that later in the year the Estate would present its emerging vision document, to include the nature restoration project, regenerative farming, country park, energy park and Arden Cross to the Parish. A date for this presentation will be confirmed in due course.
- 6.4 there being no other business, the meeting closed.




